Protest leaders dubious about plan for economic committee

The leaders of the social protest are leaning toward not cooperating with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's ministerial team on the matter. Many of the protest leaders view the proposal as an inappropriate response to Saturday evening's mass demonstration and nearby an attempt to silence the outcry rather than come up with concrete solutions to the problems.

Dror Israel Movement, who added that the weekend's post-demonstration optimism had soured into a sense of pessimism.

"It is a moment that signifies the public's faith in the political system," Hauffer continued. "If the prime minister of Israel doesn't get up and say, 'I understand I need to change my religion,' then the situation we are in is worrying and frightening."

"Instead of getting up this morning to a statement from the prime minister that he is discussing his cabinet, that he understands the public's message from the day before, and that he plans to change the current economic system, we are greeted with an announcement of the establishment of a committee from the day before, but nothing about when its work will begin and how it is perceived as an attempt to pull the wool over the public's eyes," he said. "I am not saying that this is the essence of the prime minister's move, but at the least, if the move turns out to be a failure, don't expect me or anyone else here to be able to control the burst of energy or frustration that will subsequently come out of the mass of people."

For his part, National Union of Israeli Students Chairman Irit Shraga also was dubious about the establishment of the ministerial team, stating: "We are very ready and eager to enter into a dialogue, but we also want to know what kind of dialogue we are getting into - what the outlines are, the timetable, the authority, whether things will be anchored in legislation and expressed in the budget, or whether we will come to learn God forbid, that everything was written in secret."

Shraga warned that such a governmentally imposed initiative, if not backed by the public's ongoing fight for the demands of the protesters, "does not understand the possible implications of a move that is

perceived as an attempt to pull the wool over the public's eyes," he said. "I am not saying that this is the essence of the prime minister's move, but at the least, if the move turns out to be a failure, don't expect me or anyone else here to be able to control the burst of energy or frustration that will subsequently come out of the mass of people."

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Lieberman sees packed pubs, says social situation not so bad

The ongoing social protest is based on real concerns and isn't just about water pipes," Foreign Minister Avigdor Lieberman told journalists yesterday, as he discussed his suggestions for improving the situation of the middle class.

"But we have to close the half of the pubs that are full," Lieberman added, noting that he couldn't find a table in any of several restaurants in Tel Aviv over the weekend. "I walked through Neveh Tzedek and all the restaurants and pubs were packed, and not with tycoons," Lieberman said. "There wasn't an empty spot."

Lieberman tried to correct the negative impressions cast by his remark last week that the economic problems in Israel "should be kept in proportion." The statement was taken by many as belittling the social protest.

"Everyone is right, the teachers, the mothers, the doctors, the politicians," said Lieberman. "But Israel's greatest asset is its economic stability, and we can't harm that with hasty decisions, despite all the pressures. The first of our priorities will be the weaker population and the middle class."

Lieberman said his party (Yisrael Beiteinu) believes that there is indeed an equal sharing of the burden and called for preferential treatment for army veterans.

"We should give preference to army veterans. Half the population does not have a voice in the decision-making process," Lieberman said.

He also suggested building public housing for young mothers and the disabled, building 1,000 homes in the Negev, and the Galilee that are already approved but are stuck because the state hasn't yet laid the required infrastructure, extending the hours of day-care centers and kindergartens, and increasing the number of hospital beds, particularly in internal medicine wards.

"We shouldn't ignore the problems, but we shouldn't fall into a national depression," Lieberman said. "It's not all black."

Lieberman's secretary general Hila Bar told party activists yesterday. "If you want to change things, you have to be realistic. The (foreign minister's) committee process is a mistake. Lieberman and the government are not talking to us, and this is the only way."

"If you don't see a change in the government's attitude, we will continue to be in the streets," Lieberman said.

No way to construct a dialogue

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Mayor Ron Huldai: Answer to housing woes lies in state policy, not Tel Aviv

Tel Aviv Mayor Ron Huldai does not rule out the possibility of dismantling the protest tents that have sprung up around the city in recent weeks.

"We encouraged the protest from day one," Huldai said yesterday at a press conference marking the launch of a housing grants program for students in the city's southern neighborhoods and in Haifa.

"In general, he added, such encampments have a limited life span. They are not going to be there for generations. He was seen at a city where all its streets are filled with tent after tent.

"There is a protest here but it will end on some point," Huldai was asked about the municipality's efforts to dismantle the tents in Ramat Gan.

"From the outset, we tried to allow the protest to continue, on the one hand, but also to maintain public order on the other. The fact is, we didn't touch that encampment," he said, stressing that the city had tried to act for the good of residents there.

While Huldai refused to respond to a question from Huldai on the government's conflict in recent weeks, he said at the press conference that "the solution to the housing problem in the State of Israel does not lie in the city of Tel Aviv-Jaffa, which is a total of 51 square kilometers."

Rather, the solution to the problem, he noted, "is a governmental policy of marketing and subsidizing land, of defining affordable housing and the like."

"I welcome the storm that has erupted in Tel Aviv and hope that one day when you go to the polls, you will also vote for those who say that there is a need for involvement in the housing market."

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The London-based paper Al-Hayat termed the protests "Israeli spring" and described them as "an unprecedented event in Israeli history, in that tens of thousands of people went out into the streets to protest the cost of living, especially housing prices."

The Egyptian paper Al-Youm id-Sabeah headlined its report "The plague of Arab revolutionary reactions," and said that the Israeli protesters were "writing yesterday that 'Saturday in Israel have become a revolution' and comparing the Israeli protesters to those in Syria, Egypt and Yemen."

Many of the reports noted that the size of the protests, particularly the one that took place Saturday night, was unusual for Israel, especially for socioeconomic reasons. But some of them also stressed the protesters' political side.

The Egyptian paper Al-Wafd, for instance, headlined its report "Revolution in Israel." The paper went to topple Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. "The Palestinian newspaper Wafa ran a similar headline. "More than 50,000 demonstrators demanded that Netanyahu resign."
